COMMUNITY LED REGIONAL MIGRATION Juanita Doody, Secretary of Multicultural Tamworth Inc

What is a migrant? Migrants are NOT only refugees or asylum seekers. Migrants frequently have skills and qualifications needed in Australia as well as a high level of understanding and comprehension of the English language.

Multicultural Tamworth Inc as an organisation has been operating for a few years now but Tamworth has a very long history of successful community-led migration which is now recognised at both State and Federal levels. We assist migrants by

- Connecting them to services such as Health, Jobs, Schools, Education
- Educating them on life in regional Australia and small rural communities
- Advocating on their behalf such as legal matters, medical, government service providers
- Providing opportunities for social connection within the wider community
- Providing free English conversation for adults and homework help for school-aged students

Our other role is to

- Educate the wider community on needs of migrants and cross-cultural engagement
- Provide community with opportunities to meet and connect with migrants to break down barriers and give a framework for relationships to form such as Fiesta la Peel, Celebrating Cultural events
- > Distributing relevant information such as Fair Work, Road and Maritime Services, Health issues and Australian laws

Key needs of migrants coming to Tamworth

- Housing short and long-term accommodation
- Work short and long-term employment
- School / child care options
- Social connection
- Driving practice help with obtaining an Australian licence
- Transport can be linked to securing a job.
- Different needs depending on VISA category Skilled migrant visa means NO government assistance

Tamworth celebrates 40 years of Laotian settlement this year – the local community embraced these refugee families (displaced by war in the early 1970's) and they quickly became a part of our local community with many families still living in Tamworth today.

Our most recent arrivals are not from refugee backgrounds and come from Croatia, Bosnia, Brazil, United Kingdom, Italy, Zimbabwe and South Africa. As skilled regional Visa holders they have to source their own jobs and cannot access job agencies or Centrelink assistance while they look for work and accommodation – not easy.

Sponsored Visa holders are usually coming to a specific job such as motor mechanics, meat works, medical / health industry, electrician or trades.

The topic of VISAS is very complicated and continues to change which causes a lot of extra problems and adds to the needs of migrants when they come.

Tamworth can offer many choices of eating places now – Chinese, Indian, Vietnamese, Filipino, Thai, Mexican, African, Italian and has a few Indian / Asian grocery shops in the city as well.

In November 2017 I represented Multicultural Tamworth Inc at a special Roundtable discussion on regional migration which was held in Canberra. Tamworth was one of 17 communities in Australia considered successful because we are community based. The research confirmed that rural communities were / are addressing rural decline by encouraging migrants to settle and work in their communities as they filled the jobs that had been left by local people relocating to larger cities. Thanks to this growth in rural populations – schools are not being closed down and the local economy is growing again.

SHELTERBOX UPDATE – August 2018

Current activity/deployments

Indonesia: A team arrived in Indonesia at the weekend and are assessing the need and any response we may be able to provide with the support of local Rotary partners.

Ethiopia: A team have been deployed to identify beneficiaries and plan distributions alongside overseeing the internal logistics of aid when it arrives. The scope of this project is to support 2000 families displaced by violence. At the moment around 60% of internally displaced peoples in Ethiopia are staying in crowded and unsuitable collective centres, others are with host families or sleeping outside at high-altitude with no protection from the weather - particularly rain. Our first aid shipments are on route to help alleviate this situation.

Kenya: We have a team of six in Kenya focusing on logistics, training and beneficiary selection. Our first shipments have arrived in Nairobi from Belgium.

Cameroon: We are currently planning to deploy a team mid-late August to assess how various projects are working. Between 2015 and 2017 we supported over 7,000 families in Cameroon.

Somaliland: A team are planning to deploy in September.

Niger: Phase Two distributions are planned to start in the next few weeks. The scope of this project is to support 1,329 households displaced by conflict.
