ORIGIN OF SOME EVERY-DAY EXPRESSIONS

At Sixes and Sevens

This phrase probably evolves from dice-games and seems to have developed from a 14th century idiom *set on cinque and sice*. So originally the numbers were not six and seven but five and six, and the expression was used in connection with the elements of chance and luck in human life, rather than disorder or disagreement.

There is a far more colourful theory of the origin of the phrase, though its historical accuracy is questionable. Two of the old Livery Companies (originally the craft guilds) of the City of London had a longstanding quarrel over their order of precedence. The Skinners and the Merchant Taylors, both founded in 1327, ranked sixth and seventh in priority among the guilds, but which was sixth and which was seventh? In ceremonial processions, the two groups were at sixes and sevens over the right to claim sixth position, and the ensuing fights no doubt had the whole parade at sixes and sevens.

In 1484 a settlement was eventually enforced by the Lord Mayor of London and his aldermen: the officials of both guilds were to entertain each other annually to dinner, and the companies were to take turns year by year at sixth positions in processions.



HUNTER MEDICAL RESEARCH INSTITUTE (HMRI)

Guest Speaker – Libby Rodgers-McPhee

Introduced by Anne Jacob – Thanked by Louise Matthews

Libby opened by congratulating Tamworth City on celebrating its 200th birthday and noting that she was a Rotary Exchange Student to Germany back in 1973. Libby also congratulated PDG Bob and Margaret Ryan for their fund-raising efforts in cardio vascular disease for a PHD student and for Professor Andrew Boyles research.

However, HMRI is also celebrating its 20th anniversary this year. It began in 1998 with 90 affiliated researchers and now has over 1600 researchers, students and support staff. It is a partnership between the community, Hunter New England Health and the University of Newcastle which in turn collaborates with the University of New England (the latter for the past ten years) and now internationally.

HMRI concentrates on three major areas:

Seven (7) Research Programs – covers Cardiovascular: Pregnancy and Reproduction: Cancer: Brain and Mental Health: Viruses, Infections, Vaccines and Asthma (VIVA): Genomics and Precision Medicine and Public Health

Clinical Trials Support Unit - covers Bio-statisticians and Bio-informatics and Health Research Economics – Health Technology Assessment.

The Excellence in Research Australia (ERA) independently ranks the quality of HMRI/UON medical research at above, or well above, world standard. Last week the Federal Government announced a \$6.1million grant from the Medical Research Future Fund to support the Centre which includes HMRI.

HMRI receives funding from both national and state governments but in order for that to happen we need the donor support to plant the seed.

Other areas HMRI covers are

- Rural Health Out of Hospital Care
- Rural Health and Stroke Finder Helmet (we have two at \$50,000 each)
- Cancer Research in Tamworth Cancer Clinical Trails and Breast Cancer studies
- Cancer Research in Tamworth Radiation Therapy
- Rural Health Mental Health
- Rural Cardiovascular Health
- Rural Health and Telehealth
- Indigenous Health health research and ArtsHealth program in Tamworth and Walgett
- Indigenous Health Improving the health of Aboriginal children
- Rural Health Respiratory
