OUR SPEAKER TODAY IS PAUL STEVENSON TOPIC - NEW ROAD RULES AND HOW TO KEEP YOUR LICENCE

The presentation was mostly with video so have listed the key topics and most pertinent points

Roundabouts

Observe roadway markings Give way to any vehicle in the roundabout Indicate when leaving the roundabout Whilst it is allowable, best not to change lanes in a roundabout

Merging

If the lane you are travelling in finishes with a broken line all the way to the end of the lane then you must give way to the vehicles in the lane you are merging into. This type of merging lane is normally sign posted with "Give way when merging"

If the lane you are travelling in merges with another lane and the dotted line markings finish before the end of the lane then the car in the lead has the right of way.

Mobile Phones

The only time you may be using a mobile phone for telephone conversation or using it as a navigation system is when it is mounted in a commercial cradle and hands free. NO EXCEPTION. Otherwise the vehicle must be parked in a suitable place and the engine switched off.

Keeping in the Left lane

On multi lane carriageway you must keep in the left lane unless:

The speed limit is 80km per hour or less

You are turning

You are avoiding an obstacle

In congested traffic

You are overtaking a slow vehicle (within the speed limit of course)

If the road is signposted "Keep Left unless Overtaking" then you must observe these rules regardless of the posted speed limit.

Lights

High beam must be switched to low beam when you are within 200 metres of either an oncoming vehicle or behind another vehicle. It is illegal to "flash" your lights at another vehicle. Fog lights may only be used in foggy or inclement weather.

Pedestrians

When turning you must give way to pedestrians crossing the road you are turning into. The general rule is that you must give way to ALL pedestrians

U Turns

Ensure you have a clear view of the roadway in all directions No u turns allowed over unbroken lines No U turns at traffic lights unless sign posted as allowable Give way to other vehicles

Distances between vehicles when moving

Allow a 3 second gap behind the vehicle you are following. 4 seconds in wet weather or at night. 30% of crashes are vehicles hitting the vehicle in front of them.





School Zones

Normal 40kph school zone restrictions are from 8 am to 9.30 am and 2.30pm to 4pm school-days. If they differ then the different times will be shown on the restriction sign in RED

Yellow Traffic Light

Means stop unless it is unsafe to do so.

Some other lesser known rules

You can drive in bare feet

You can be no more than 3 metres away from your car if it is not locked

You are not allowed to eat whilst driving (3 points)

No occupied seat can be reclined whilst travelling

You can go through a red or amber light to make way for an emergency vehicle but must not proceed through the intersection

SNAKES ALSO KNOWN AS GARTER SNAKES (THAMNOPHISSIRTALIS) CAN BE DANGEROUS - Yes, grass snakes, not rattlesnakes.

A couple in Sweetwater, Texas, had a lot of potted plants. During a recent cold spell, the wife was bringing a lot of them indoors to protect them from a possible freeze. It turned out that a little green garden grass snake was hidden in one of the plants. When it had warmed up, it slithered out and the wife saw it go under the sofa. She let out a very loud scream.


