Some of the gains that will balance the loss of wealth and life WHAT WE ARE LEARNING IN THESE TERRIBLE DAYS

Point 6

There were other things which we should have made for ourselves and did not. The most remarkable instance is that of artificial dyes. The first artificial dye was made by a famous English chemist, Sir William Perkin, and all the rest followed from his discovery. But the men who rule our country have never believed in science, which has *always* been neglected and flouted, though our men of science have been the greatest in the world. So, in the long run, all the dyes came to be made in Germany, where science has been respected and assiduously used for scores of years.

This was very wasteful for us, and very profitable for Germany. But now we are making our own dyes, and the same is true of many valuable drugs which we used to pay Germany for, and which we can perfectly well make for ourselves. Thus, the war is actually founding several new industries in this country, which will serve us all in the coming years of peace. Some good will often come from throwing healthy men or nations on their own resources, severe though the strain may be at first.

Point 7

No empire in the world has greater resources than ours, if we would bestir ourselves; but until the war came, we were like a youngster who has inherited an immense fortune, and thinks he need not trouble about anything. Today we are thrown upon our own resources. For instance, there are certain rare metals of extreme value for some chemical purposes – for instance the making of particular qualities of steel, and mantles for the best way of burning gas for lighting purposes. Germany supplied us with these, at immense profit to herself, and we were quite content. If you are rich enough, you just buy what you want, with the least trouble, and don't care what it costs. But the supply of these things was stopped. We began to examine our own resources, and one of the results has been the discovery of large quantities of the precious ore called *wolfram* in Australia, where it will be a source of an excellent industry and much wealth. It might not have been found for another decade if the war had not made us bestir ourselves.
