RYLA Louise has confirmed that our two candidates are not available for RYLA this August but both keen to participate in April 2021.



OUR MEMBER SPEAKER TODAY IS NAOMI BLAKEY AND HER TOPIC IS TAMWORTH REGIONAL MUSEUMS

My position at Tamworth Regional Council is Cultural Collections Officer (Museums)

- Due to the Covid-19 Pandemic not all our museums are open at the present time
- However, the Tamworth Regional Gallery, The Wax Museum and the National Guitar Museum opened from Monday, 1 June 2020.

Australian Country Music Hall of Fame

- Celebrates the history of Australia Country Music and the Annual Festival
- Two important Dates Festival in January and Hats Off to Country in June / July

Barraba Museum / Nandewar Historical Society

Preserves the history of Barraba and surrounds including the Early Pioneers, Mining, Agriculture and Military History

Future Astronomy Centre / Chris Bowman Mineral and Fossil Collection

- Preserve the regionals mineral and fossil deposits including an almost complete diprotodon skull
- Opening date to be advised
- Galaxy of the Stars Wax Museum / Tamworth Information Centre
- Tells the story of over 20 notable Country Music singers
- All figurines were made by the one family in Nashville, USA then sent out to Tamworth Australia

Manilla Heritage Museum / Manilla Visitor Information Centre

Preserves and tell the stories of the town of Manilla and surrounds

Moonbi Museum

- Preserve the social and farming history of the area
- Chicken farming was of great importance to Tamworth due to its sandy soil

National Guitar Museum / Tamworth Information Centre

- Guitars from Smokey Dawson through to Keith Urban
- Also has Australian Wall of Fame listing all Gold Guitar Winners

Nundle Visitor Information Centre / Gil Bennet Rocks, Gems and Minerals

- Displays a magnificent collection of rock, gem and mineral specimens
- Houses a particularly interesting Sphere Collection

Powerhouse Museum

Built on original site 9 November 1888

Tamworth Historical Society / Calala Cottage

- Purpose is to tell the stories of Tamworth's beginning and development into a city
- Worth noting that it was built by Tamworth's First Mayor Philip Gidley King

Tamworth Regional Film and Sound Archive

- Preserves Tamworth and surrounds film and sound heritage
- Of particular interest is the Ison Plates Collection which were added to the UNESCO Memory of the World Register in 2019

Tamworth Regional Gallery

➤ Collection started in 1919 – donation from John Salvana – keen to promote art for children

- > Tamworth Power Station Museum
- Tamworth Regional Film and Sound Archive

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 30 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

We've helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children in 122 countries. So far, Rotary has contributed more than \$1.8 billion toward eradicating the disease worldwide.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan, Nige-ria, and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyse as many as 200,000 children each year.

We're so close to eradicating polio. Here's why we need \$1.5 billion more to finish the job.

"Rotary was there at the beginning of the global effort to eradicate polio," says International PolioPlus Committee Chair Michael K. McGovern.

"It would be unfortunate if Rotary isn't there at the finish line. We've done too much; we've made too much progress to walk away before we finish."

Finding poliovirus outside Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan, the only countries that have yet to eradicate it, is not unusual.

In 2014, just before the World Cup brought travellers from all over the planet to Brazil, poliovirus was detected in the sewage system at São Paulo's Viracopos International Airport.

Using genetic testing, officials traced its origin to Equatorial Guinea.

Brazil's regular vaccination efforts kept the disease from showing up beyond the airport doors. Those are frustrating examples for the thousands of people around the world working to eradicate polio.

The fight has come a long way, but it is far from over. And while many involved in the effort say we may detect the final naturally occurring case of polio this year, getting to that point — and ensuring that the disease remains gone — will continue to require money, hard work, and the support of Rotarians around the world.

One of the most important aspects of the fight to eradicate polio is detection. This requires continuous surveillance that is complicated and costly.

Polio surveillance consists of two parts.

First, doctors and community health workers monitor children for acute flaccid paralysis.

The second part of the process involves local authorities collecting samples from sewage systems or in places that don't have adequate sanitation facilities, including rivers or bodies of water near a large group of residents.

We must all continue to support the fight to End Polio and eradicate the disease from the Earth.
