




Guest Speaker - Bill Gleeson

Tamworth Musical Society







When the tag was given to Tamworth Country Music, a well-known musician, John Muller in Tamworth said, "you know that is not quite right, it should be "Music Capital of County Australia" as we have such a variety of music in Tamworth" and have had since the earliest times.

Before white settlement there was a beautiful freshwater lagoon between West Tamworth and East Tamworth. The local indigenous tribes would gather there to fish and hunt kangaroos and emus. For hundreds of years the tribes met and held their corroborees on the eastern side of the lagoon, so music has always been an important part of Tamworth.

White settlers arrived in 1840 and brought with them their various types of music. In 1846 a number of artistic groups formed and unfortunately these didn't survive for very long but by 1888 things changed. This change occurred when the Tamworth Musical Society formed and still remains today. This is one of the oldest community groups in Tamworth and in fact is one of the oldest performing groups in Australia.

How did it all start? "The Movers and Shakers" of Tamworth have always been behind the success of the group. Around this time the Reagan family came to Tamworth, and they had travelled to England and attended a number of the Gilbert & Sullivan productions. On their return they suggested the group perform these types of operettas. These productions were held in the "Old fellows Hall" situated between where the Town Hall and the Tamworth Police Station are situated now. In 1888 the first show was "Pinaforme" and from then on, all their productions were very successful. For a long time, all proceeds gained from these productions went back to the community. The group remained in these premises for approximately two years and then made a move to "Allambie Hall" located approximately where the Services Club is on Marius Street and these premises actually had electricity.

The group remained there until they were able to move to a hall behind the old Central Hotel (CH on Peel) This is where they remained until the hotel burnt down and they had to make a further move to what was called the "Theatre Royal" located on the corner of Dowe and Brisbane Streets (CH on Peel Boutique Hotel)

In 1927 the group moved into a beautiful building called "The Capital Theatre" on Brisbane Street. This was a grand building which could seat 1400 people and was made up of three levels. The Town Hall was completed in 1934, and the group then relocated and remained in the Town Hall for over 76 yrs until their final move to the Capital Theatre in Centrepoint Shopping Centre in 2009.

So, what makes Tamworth Musical Society so successful, really two things:

People involved in the group willing and wanting to perform without payment and the number of extraordinary business people and individuals who have provided support throughout time.

In 1901 P.J. Smith arrived in Tamworth. He was the owner of a local store and had interests in horse racing/breeding and real estate. He loved to perform, and he starred in many of the productions at the Theatre Royal. He remained with the society for 51 years, starting as a choir boy and then eventually patron of the society.

Bill too commenced as a choir boy in 1959 and then became patron, but will soon stop that as it is time for someone else to provide influence for the direction of the society.

Where is the society going? Now days the costs of a production range from \$100,00 to \$200,00 so the society must make money to continue future productions. There are substantial costs for:

Rights of name- Approximately \$3,000 but further costs on takings for the production. This can be between 15% to 20% of takings.

Scenery and costumes need to be hired because of the huge amount of time and cost to locally put these together.

If the Society wasn't to present any productions, there would still be a cost of \$40,000 to pay for insurance and a storage shed. The society tries very hard to keep the costs of tickets as low as possible and under \$50 where other societies are now charging at least \$100 per ticket

With these costs the society is unable to provide funding to community and certainly all society members perform without payment. Some other locations pay their orchestra, but Tamworth orchestra members perform without expectation of payment.

In 2013 Tamworth Musical Society produced "The Phantom of the Opera" with Robert McDougall as the lead and the leading lady from Coonabarabran. This has been one of their most successful productions in recent times. The leading lady had to travel from Coonabarabran twice a week for rehearsals.

There were a few challenges during this production because a huge chandelier had to fall heavily on the stage with the orchestra under the stage. During rehearsals the orchestra wasn't present and were not aware the chandelier would be crashing down on the stage above them. It appears orchestra members had a lot to say after the chandelier fell so heavily above their heads, apparently not a pleasant experience.

The next interesting story told was about the Town Hall ghost "Blue" As a small boy Bill recalled over the years hearing about Blue from different caretakers and the antics Blue got up to, such as opening and closing of doors and flushing toilets. One particular story was about Blue saving the burning of the Town Hall. Peter Godden who was providing the lighting for productions heard a voice call out "Blue, Blue". He looked up and one of the lighting bars was burning and this is what saved the Town Hall. Bill goes on to tell the story of a time he had just finished acting in a production and was crossing the stage to his dressing room when he felt a blast of freezing air on his face. The caretaker then said, "Blue did you enjoy the show tonight" There wasn't a response, so Bill believes Blue didn't enjoy it and that's why there was a freezing blast.

Why does The Tamworth Musical Society attract over 100 members with the average age of 22 years old? The arrival of Peter Ross has made a major impact, and he brings to the society, acting, directing and an absolute genius at putting together successful productions. Peter has revolutionised people's thinking, and the young people are involved and developing skills and close comradery.

The present venue is adequate currently, but we look forward to gaining funding for a Tamworth Arts Precinct in the future. There have been some very good years recently for the society and this year in particular has been very successful. Each year there are two productions, one in April and another in October. Bill attended numerous productions in regional areas, Coffs Harbour, Orange and Wagga Wagga and Tamworth Society is well up there and the reason they are so successful is because of the attitude of production participants are not paid where other areas provide payments to the orchestra members
